

Modern Slavery & Human Trafficking Statement

This statement is made pursuant to Section 54 of the Modern Slavery Act of 2015 (the “MSA”). It describes the steps we have undertaken—and are continuing to undertake—to ensure that modern slavery and human trafficking are not taking place within our business or supply chain.

Who We Are:

JCC Lighting Products Ltd. (“JCC”) is a market leader in the development of cutting-edge LED lighting technology for domestic, commercial and industrial applications. Our head office is in Chichester, West Sussex, England, and we currently have 101 employees in the UK.

The MSA:

Section 54 of the MSA imposes an obligation on certain businesses supplying goods and services in the UK to report each year on the steps they have taken to ensure that slavery and human trafficking is not taking place in any of its supply chains, and in any part of its own business. This includes both adults and children being forced to work against their free will.

Our Policies on Slavery and Human Trafficking:

JCC subscribes to a zero-tolerance approach when it comes to any and all forms of slavery and human trafficking—whether it be inside our own facilities or in the factories and facilities of our suppliers where goods we purchase are made. Our anti-slavery position reflects our commitment to acting ethically and with integrity in all our business relationships with respect to fundamental human rights. JCC is committed to implementing and maintaining effective systems and controls to ensure, as best we can, that slavery and human trafficking is not taking place in our supply chain. We do not engage in slavery, forced labour, child labour or human trafficking and we expect the same from our supply chain. In that regard, we expect our suppliers to comply with all applicable laws prohibiting slavery, forced labour, child labour and human trafficking. We also expect that our suppliers compensate their employees fairly by maintaining reasonable employee work hours and by providing wages and benefits that comply with the national laws of the jurisdictions in which they do business. JCC reserves the right to audit our suppliers to confirm that our suppliers are following applicable laws relating to slavery, forced labour, child labour and human trafficking. We also reserve the right to request corrective action should any of our suppliers fall short of these legal requirements. JCC reserves the right to terminate business relationships with suppliers who fail to comply with applicable slavery, forced labour, child labour or human trafficking laws. JCC continues to evaluate other measures to help ensure that its operations and supply chain are free of slavery and human trafficking.

Supply Chain Due Diligence:

JCC routinely undertakes measures to identify and mitigate the risks of modern slavery within our supply chains. Our approach includes:

- Conducting initial onboarding audits for all suppliers to ensure that slavery, forced labour, child labour and human trafficking is not taking place at the supplier level;
- Requiring strict compliance with applicable laws relating to slavery, forced labour, child labour and human trafficking;
- Requiring suppliers to provide information and assurances with respect to their own policies and practices to ensure that slavery, forced labour, child labour and human trafficking is not taking place at supplier facilities or within supplier’s supply chains; and
- Conducting bi-annual surveillance audits to ensure continued supplier compliance with applicable laws relating to slavery, forced labour, child labour and human trafficking.

Training:

To ensure a high level of understanding of the risks of slavery, forced labour, child labour and human trafficking in our supply chain and our business operations, JCC has evaluated various MSA training programs to help ensure that appropriate personnel within JCC are aware of MSA requirements and the need to ensure, as best we can, that our supply chain is free of slavery, forced labour, child labour and human trafficking. In that regard, JCC has implemented an MSA/anti-slavery training program for key employees at JCC, including those working in quality and supply chain management, product, commercial, finance, and senior management roles responsible for oversight, due diligence and decision-making. Training is provided on a bi-annual basis through the iHasco compliance e-learning platform and forms part of our induction process for relevant new and promoted employees.

Measuring Our Success:

JCC continues to review and evaluate various methods to measure our success in combating modern slavery in our supply chain. In addition to the above-mentioned measures, some of the other methods implemented by JCC include, for example:

- Routine supply chain questionnaires to help identify suppliers who do not abide by applicable legal requirements relating to slavery, forced labour and human trafficking.
- Supplier site visits to confirm supplier's compliance with applicable anti-slavery legal requirements.
- Corrective action plans and measures for those suppliers that fail to follow applicable anti-slavery legal requirements.

Other measures may be undertaken to help ensure that slavery and human trafficking is not taking place in our business or in our supply chain.
